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The National Black Prolife coalition is outraged as more and more abortionists are being exposed for unsafe and abusive practices. Recent news out of New York, Philadelphia and other states stunned many in the African American community after report after report revealed a growing disproportionate impact on black women. In New York City more black babies die from abortion than are being born. For every 1,000 black children that are born, 1,489 die in the City's abortion dens.

Philadelphia's 'house of horror' eclipsed other reports that revealed abortionists have routinely violated state and federal laws related to the safety of women and children. "The abortion industry has been allowed to run unchecked for decades, said Stephen Broden of the NBPC in Dallas, Texas. This lack of government oversight has left a trail of reproductively maimed women and millions of dead babies who have not seen justice for this irreparable harm," he said.

"We gather today all across America to mourn for these women and babies and to sound the alarm against such unfettered actions in the future, said Day Gardner of Black Prolife Union. We gather to demand the Congress, Governor and state legislators take immediate and aggressive steps to protect women from these dreaded abortionists. We gather today to demand an investigation into the abortion industry's clear pattern of population control that is having a genocidal impact on the black community."

The pattern of genocidal intent can be seen simply by observing where most of the clinics are located said Cleon Childress of LEARN, NE . In some states *all* abortion clinics are located in urban areas where blacks reside. While the industry may argue this is due to happenstance, empirical evidence demonstrates otherwise and the clear picture is one of intent that targets black women.

"Today we mourn. We mourn for the women who lost their lives. We mourn for the babies that have lost their lives. We mourn for the loss of possibilities. Tomorrow, we march and fight for the civil rights of the babies and for the protection of black women", said Alveda King. "We can no longer allow this last bastion of discrimination to prevail and we will work to tear it down", she said.

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
